Reflection

Today let us think of new beginnings, and what better place to start than in the very beginning. In the beginning God. 'In the beginning' cannot mean the absolute beginning, because God is eternal and had no beginning. God has always been. This can be very reassuring as well as something to ponder on. It also means that 'in the



beginning' refers to the beginning of creation.

When God created the heavens and the earth, he created it from, as The Message translation puts it, "a soup of nothingness, a bottomless emptiness, an inky blackness." You can almost imagine what that was like. When we have been to a Good Friday service and the lights are dimmed and we leave in darkness talking to nobody, there is almost a sense of isolation and inky blackness and yet we know events that will change that. The contrast of Easter Day with the bright light, flowers and a joyousness deep within, is remarkable.

For me there was an experience, many years ago, where I experienced a darkness in my life, which was frightening and difficult to cope with. A minister prayed with me and I can only say that the darkness lifted very suddenly and the world became a place more beautiful than I had ever seen it. I was filled with praise and thanksgiving.

From darkness to light, how amazing that was on that first day, when the light erupts from the inky blackness and the life of creation takes off. It must have been awesome!!

Gospel Reading : Mark 1: 1 - 14

Reflection - New beginnings

When I was at school, we had a stationery cupboard where you went at a particular time to get new stationery when your old books were full and signed by the teacher. Our rough books were quite big and thick and it took ages to get to the end. When the time came, I loved getting the new one and every time I vowed I would keep it neater than the last! Sad or what? When we look back over time, there have been many new beginnings of one sort or another. We think of new jobs, falling in love, getting married,



moving house, arrival of babies, and so the list can go on.

In The Message, Mark begins his gospel with these words: "The good news of Jesus Christ - the Message! - begins here, following to the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. 'Watch closely: I'm sending my preacher ahead of you; He'll make the road smooth for you. Thunder in the desert! Prepare for God's arrival! Make the road smooth and straight!'"

Enter John the Baptist, who heralds the best beginning imaginable. John is in the desert and crowds of people come looking for him as word spreads. They come looking for his baptism. They want to confess their sins and be baptised and receive this new life. A new beginning. John then begins to tell them that the baptism that they received from him in the Jordan turns their old life into a kingdom life. John goes on to tell them that the one who will come after will baptise with the Holy Spirit and it will be a holy baptism. In the words from The Message we read, "a holy baptism, by the Holy spirit, will change you from the inside out."

If Victoria were here now, I would get her to lead the song with the words, "shine from the inside out, that the world will know you live in me." I guess this would be, what John the Baptist was getting at. This really was an amazing new beginning. So enters Jesus.

This year because of all the disappointments and the worry of the virus, I decided for my Advent reading, to go back to a book I used many years ago by Joyce Hugget, entitled *Joy to the World*. It is a book some of you may be familiar with. It is beautifully written, laid out with Bible readings, pen and ink drawings, music, meditation and prayer. It has certainly meant a lot to me this Christmas time especially with all the restrictions in place: Jesus entering our world, bringing new life for all, helping us to see again new beginnings for each one of us.



Today, in our reading, as we see Jesus baptised by John and then the spirit descending, this was another new beginning; indeed, the most amazing new beginning. Up until then, people imagined that there was a rigid barrier dividing heaven and earth. Here we see the sky split open and the power of God as spirit descending through, as a dove, and God is so pleased and proud. This then is really a new beginning, not just for the ministry of Jesus, but for each one of us and our relationship with God.

Every time we mess up, and I do it often, we are given yet another clean sheet, another new beginning as we confess our wrong doings or inactivity and confess our real need of Jesus in our life. Let us now, in prayer, confess our wrong doings and express our need to be filled again with the Holy Spirit.
